(1) CALL TO ORDER

The hybrid, in-person and virtual NWARPC/Policy Committee meeting was called to order by Chair Mayor Doug Sprouse at 1:32 p.m.

(2) ROLL CALL OF MEMBERS

In-person attendees introduced themselves and Tim Conklin named the virtual attendees. Luke Aitken recorded member names and tallied votes. A guorum was reached.

(3) APPROVAL OF FEBRUARY 26, 2025, RPC/POLICY COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

Chair Mayor Doug Sprouse stated that February 26, 2025, Policy Committee meeting minutes were presented for approval. Sprouse asked for any comments or corrections on the minutes and hearing none from the committee requested a motion to approve the item.

<u>MOTION:</u> John McCurdy made a motion to approve February 26, 2025, RPC/Policy Committee Meeting Minutes as presented. Seconded by Mayor Chris Keeney. Motion carried unanimously.

(4) DIRECTOR REPORT & CLEARINGHOUSE REPORT

Chair Mayor Doug Sprouse introduced the item, and Director Tim Conklin said the commission expects to have their FFY 2024 Financial Audit completed by the end of March, at which point staff will upload the audit to the federal audits clearinghouse and send a copy to all commission members for their records. He then mentioned that the Commission has been invited to apply for a Walton Family Foundation grant to bring a delegation from the region to attend the 33rd Congress for New Urbanism, which will take place in Providence, RI on June 11-14, 2025. Conklin stated that the 34th Congress for New Urbanism will be held right here in Northwest Arkansas in the summer of 2026, and encouraged members to attend this year's congress in Rhode Island, setting the stage as conference hosts for the 2026 event coming to NWA.

Conklin stated that several bills have been filed at the AR State Legislature which could change cities' and counties' authorities related to land use planning and zoning regulation. Conklin stated that the Governor had signed ACT 313 and ACT 314, focusing on removing regulations around accessory dwelling units and municipal territorial jurisdiction respectively. Members were also briefed on several significant bills under consideration, including SB518 (floodplain regulation), SB456 (housing flexibility), and HB1754 (property use restrictions). There was discussion among members on how to comply with the new laws, the likelihood of some of the bills being passed into law, and around the possible effects of the new legislation on land use planning efforts in the region. Lastly Conklin outlined recent federal funding requests, featured in the latest Federal-Aid Clearinghouse Report, and said this report is shared for informational purposes only and no action is needed by the Board.

Conklin asked if there were any questions from the group and there were none heard.

(5) STATEWIDE NORTHWEST ARKANSAS ENERGY & ENVIRONMENT INNOVATION COMPREHENSIVE ACTION PLAN (NWA EEI PLAN) APPROVAL

Chair Mayor Doug Sprouse introduced the item, and Tim Conklin gave an overview of the completion of the Northwest Arkansas Energy and Environment Innovation Comprehensive Action Plan (NWA EEI Plan). Conklin said the plan was 100-percent funded through a subaward of the EPA CPRG Planning Grant through the Arkansas Department of Energy and Environment (ADEE). This plan enabled the Tri-Region Coalition to be eligible for the awarded \$99.99 million EPA CPRG Implementation Grant. The next steps involve the formal adoption of the plan and continued reporting on the grant's implementation to ADEE through 2027.

Conklin said the NWA EEI Comprehensive Action Plan Supplement was sent to the State of Arkansas on February 28, 2025 in accordance with the grant agreement, and includes objectives such as a voluntary framework to align local efforts and increase funding opportunities. Challenges addressed in the plan include rapid growth, limited transportation choices, infrastructure needs, and waste management. Conklin said the plan also includes a nature-based solutions GIS mapping tool available to all planning partners as a planning resource.

A. <u>RESOLUTION #2025-06</u> – Approving the Northwest Arkansas Energy & Environment Innovation Comprehensive Action Plan (NWA EEI Plan)

Chair Mayor Sprouse asked whether there were any questions from the group, and hearing none, requested a motion to approve Resolution #2025-06 Approving the Northwest Arkansas Energy & Environment Innovation Comprehensive Action Plan (NWA EEI Plan).

<u>MOTION:</u> Judge Barry Moehring made a motion to approve Resolution #2025-06 Approving the Northwest Arkansas Energy & Environment Innovation Comprehensive Action Plan (NWA EEI Plan) Seconded by Lane Crider. Motion carried unanimously.

(6) PROJECT AND OTHER UPDATES

A. NWARPC Funding Programs (STBGP-A/TAP/CRP)

Chair Mayor Doug Sprouse introduced the item and Nicole Gibbs stated that project sponsors should be working toward obligation of their federal aid projects and the timely submission of quarterly reports to ARDOT and NWARPC.

Gibbs shared the timeline for the FFY 2026 NWARPC Funding Programs along with the estimated funding apportionments for each of the commissions three funding programs. She also emphasized the importance of member jurisdictions having a signed resolution from their city council for a complete funding application. She presented the following timeline:

B. Forward2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), Transit Alternatives Study (TAS) and Travel Demand Model (TDM) Updates

Tim Reavis provided an overview of recent staff efforts to kick off the *Forward2050 Plan* (2050 MTP) and its components. He stated that the MTP is federally required to be updated every five years. He said NWARPC is under contract with consultant WSP to assist staff in developing two key components of the MTP: an update to the Travel Demand Model (TDM) and a new Transit Alternatives Study (TAS) to better prepare the region for its projected population growth through 2050.

Reavis said that a public survey to help inform the plan was launched on March 1, 2025. He stated that the questions featured on that survey will be mostly identical to those posed during the 2045 MTP development and the responses will be compared with those received in the past. He also mentioned that there will be open house style meetings held at the Fayetteville Public Library April 9, 2025 and the Bentonville Public Library April 10, 2025 to gather public input to support the plans development. He said consultant WSP will be present at the Open House meetings to provide more information on the TDM and TAS updates.

Reavis said the regional transportation plans' core goals remain focused on the integration of local plans and guidance to improve the quality of life in NWA as the region's population rapidly grows. The transit modes studied in the TAS will be Bus Rapid Transit, Light Rail, and Commuter Rail. He asked whether there were any questions.

C. Other Ongoing Project Updates

NWA Vision Zero – SS4A Safety Action Plan – Phase 2

Tim Conklin explained that the Commission is currently working with consultant Toole Design to carry out Phase 2 of the NWA Vision Zero SS4A (Safe Streets and Roads for All) Safety Action Plan, including development and adoption of the Regional Complete Streets Design Guide which was adopted by the Board last month. He said that Toole Design is also working with five of our member cities to develop their own individual safety action plans with tailored recommendations for local implementation. He shared the following status of phase two deliverables:

Razorback Greenway Corridor Plan

Tim Reavis recapped recent progress made with consultant team from Field Operations on the Razorback Greenway Corridor Master Plan. He said the consultant team came to NWA earlier this month to meet with NWARPC staff and conducted a site visit to portions of the greenway. He said the first Advisory Committee for the planning effort, with leaders from seven cities present, will be held on April 3, 2025 and one-on-one meetings with the consultant team and city leadership will be held on May 1 and 2, 2025. The leaders from all seven cities will also accompany Field Operations and NWARPC staff on a trip to the Atlanta Beltline and adjacent developments on April 24, 2025.

Aitken recapped the groups last meeting held in February and said the MS4 Stormwater Compliance group's next meeting will be held virtually on April 16, 2025 at 10:30 AM.

D. NWA GIS User Group
